PLAINTIFFS' MEMORÂNDUM OF LAW IN SUPPORT OF MOTION TO CONVENE A THREE-JUDGE COURT

Plaintiffs Richard Vieth and Norma Jean Vieth respectfully submit this Memorandum of Law in support of their Motion to Convene a Three-Judge Court pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 2284(a).

ARGUMENT

In their Complaint, Plaintiffs allege that the current congressional apportionment and districting plan for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania violates various provisions of the United States Constitution. Specifically, Plaintiffs allege that the congressional districts currently in place violate the one-person, one-vote principle of the Equal Protection Clause of Section 1 of the Fourteenth Amendment, as well as their rights under Section 2 of Article 1, the Privileges or Immunities Clause of Section 1 of the Fourteenth Amendment, and Section 1 of the Fifteenth Amendment. Plaintiffs also allege that the current apportionment violates their rights under Section 1983 of Title 42 of the United States Code and Section 2c of Title 2 of the United States Code.

Accordingly, pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 2284(a), Plaintiffs have moved to convene a three-judge court to hear these claims. That statute reads as follows:

A district court of three judges shall be convened . . . when an action is filed challenging the constitutionality of the apportionment of congressional districts . . .

28 U.S.C. § 2284(a). Inasmuch as this action directly challenges the constitutionality of the current apportionment of Pennsylvania's congressional districts, it plainly requires the appointment of a three-judge court.

CONCLUSION

For the reasons set forth above, Plaintiffs respectfully request that a

three-judge court be convened pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 2284(a).
